## TOP 10 AFTERNOON TEA WALKS


# Old Teahouse, Beaconsfield

Did you know that taking breaks for tea is a tradition that goes back 200 years? With this in mind, Christopher Fisher enjoys tea in historical surroundings at The Old Teahouse, Beaconsfield.

### WALKING INFORMATION:

A simple 60 minute stroll.

1. The walk starts at The Royal Standard Of England pub, Forty Green. The pub was named Best Pub of The Year and Freehouse of the Year 2009, so make sure you have a drink. Also, take a look at the beautiful weather vane before you start your walk, as it can be seen for miles and is a significant marker for the pub!
2. Leaving the pub, you should arrive on a junction with Brindles Lane. Walk to the bottom of Brindles Lane, and turn left onto Forty Green Road. Continue walking in the direction of Penn Road. Ignore the first footpath on your right, but take the second, which travels through some woodland, called Hogback Wood.
3. Now go straight ahead, ignore a footpath leaving to the right. Instead, continue on through Hogback Wood. The footpath will later curve to the right and will connect you to an unnamed road in Beaconsfield.
4. Turn left on the unnamed road, which will eventually become Woodside Road. When you reach a fork, take the right fork, which will lead you onto Baring Road. At the roundabout, turn right onto Burkes Parade, which turns into The Highway and then Station Road.
5. Go straight ahead here, passing by Davenies School and the National Film and Television School on your left. Shortly after this, the road name will change to Aylesbury End. You will also pass by a church and Post Office on your left, before reaching a further roundabout.
6. Go straight ahead at the roundabout, onto Windsor End where you will reach The Old Teahouse on your left.
7. Once you are afternoon tea ed out (Hopefully not forever, as there is one more to go!) return to Aylesbury End. Walk straight ahead, passing by the National Film and Television School and Devenies School again which will be on your right. Continue on as the road name changes to The Highway. There are plenty of roads leaving on your left and right: ignore these.
8. Continue on until you reach Gregories Road leaving to your left, which is also close to the Railway station located on your right.
9. Follow the road all the way along, ignoring a series of roads leaving to your left, until you meet a junction with Riding Lane. Here, turn right, crossing over the railway, and passing by Hogback Wood to your right.
10. The road will lead you in the direction of Forty Green; turn right onto the first turning to your right Forty Green Road, but take the first left Brindles Lane immediately on your left. This will connect you to your starting point at The Royal Standard of England pub.
